



A Candidate for Mayor Who Clearly States, He is not a Politician

This past month I learned from someone I have worked with this past year on rallies, civic events, and homeless concerns that he has decided to run for mayor of San Diego. I was both surprised and impressed.

We all know the seriousness of this position, and the fact that the current mayor had been aspiring for that position most of his time as a politician, which is his entire adult life. I am referring to Mayor Todd Gloria.

Larry Turner, who resides in East Village with his wife and two young children, is also a Lieutenant Colonel and

community relations officer with the San Diego Police Department. He has been serving the downtown district in that capacity, however, has been involved with almost every community in the city of San Diego, except for San Ysidro. Prior to this position he was a member of the SWAT team for the SDPD.

Turner retired from the Marines serving in many capacities, including as an intelligence officer. Obviously, Turner has served in roles in the military and police department that requires quick thinking, stamina, determination and strategic planning and leadership skills.

Those qualities and skills might serve us well at this time while we are dealing with some very serious issues at city hall and since the following has been shared by San Diegans throughout the city:

- Homeless population has gotten out of control over the last three years, leading to an increase in health and crime related issues.
- Sex trafficking in the school system and in the city are the highest in the country.
- Cost of living in the city has gotten worse over the last three years: housing, food, gasoline, utilities, and water.
 - Affordable housing crisis continues to get worse.
- Quality of life for San Diegans has been jeopardized beyond expectations.
- Small businesses are struggling to survive due to costs and regulations that seem to be counter to creating an equitable business climate.

During a recent conversation with Turner, we discussed these points above. He stated that he has already assembled an intelligent and experienced group of business professionals who are ready to "hit the ground running" upon his appointment as mayor in 2024.

It's obvious from his passionate comments and "ready to move forward"

attitude that Turner believes that preparation and a strategically organized plan is necessary to overcome the challenges that we are dealing with in the city of San Diego.

He offered that his decision to run for office came about after numerous friends, associates, and business leaders from throughout the city asked for him to make this commitment.

"I feel it is my civic responsibility to run for mayor," offered Turner, and added "When I am done serving in this capacity, I plan to go back to being a member of the SDPD.

Obviously, that's the exception in today's world. Most people running for office make this a career, which unfortunately, may not be serving us well.

I think most of us agree that what is lacking among our elected officials is understanding what it's like out of the political arena. They have become so entrenched among the political culture that they are "out of touch" with their constituents. That's what I am experiencing and hear frequently from residents from throughout the city.

Without sharing the components of his plan for addressing the homeless, which are quite impressive and aggressive, I will state that he will focus on compassion and a common-sense approach that incorporates a lot of experience in dealing with this population daily. This is due to his role as community relations officer with the SDPD and as a resident of East Village, which is experiencing daily an increase in homelessness, drug activity and crime.

Going into the mayoral campaign as an independent, Turner offered, "I have no strings attached to me, I owe no one."

In today's political climate, this is also very encouraging. We know that those allegiances can do more to detract from doing what is right for all San Diegans.

Turner also plans to be out in the community daily when "he is mayor." Sitting behind a desk and directing others isn't how he functions. Again, what a refreshing change.

Though I can share more at this time, I plan to do so on a regular basis. As noted in the bullet points earlier, the majority of San Diegans feel that we are not functioning in a healthy political or business climate. It is time to consider how a leadership change at the mayor's office can be exactly what we need to regain our commitment to be America's finest city. With all of this in mind, Larry Turner has my full attention.

"I firmly believe that faith and character education go hand in hand," Coito said, reflecting on the impact of Catholic education. "I have personally experienced and witnessed how a strong foundation in faith can shape young minds, instilling values such as compassion, empathy, and integrity. And now, as an educator, I am blessed to be a part of that development at St. Vincent de Paul.

Coito continued to explain her mindset and philosophy of education. "I aim to empower my students to become knowledgeable individuals and compassionate leaders in our ever-changing world."

Coito isn't the only familiar face back at St. Vincent's. The school is happy to welcome back Ashley de Santi, a former teacher and alumna of St. Vincent's School; Burak Arnas, a former teacher; and Rosemary Watson, a long-time resident of Mission Hills and parishioner of St. Vincent's Parish.

"Our teachers have spent countless hours preparing for the year ahead. They're eager to inspire and challenge students to reach their full potential and develop the whole child," Coito stated. "The energy and enthusiasm

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
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
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Annual Día de Los Muertos Celebration Lights Up Old Town San Diego

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Sharing Passwords Among Family Members

When my father passed away a few years ago, my brother and I began to take a more active role in helping my mother. This included everything from helping her manage her cable

and WiFi to banking to going with her to doctor appointments. At some point, every single one of these activities requires a password, so we needed to figure out the best way to store her passwords safely and securely, yet still enable the three of us to access them from different ends of the state.

This is hardly a new phenomenon, but as passwords are becoming more complex and multi-factor authentication is becoming more common, sharing passwords securely has become much more difficult.

One thing that security experts agree on is that passwords should never be written down. Why? Because they can be easily stolen. In our case, it wouldn't have worked anyway, since a written list is only good until the password changes, which some websites force you to do regularly.

Our first solution was a shared Google spreadsheet. This was somewhat secure, since Google accounts require you to set up a password to log in, but it wasn't great security. It was a step above having a written list, and anytime someone had to change a password, we could go into the spreadsheet and change it there. It also allowed us to write down

the answers to security questions, save PINS, etc., so it wasn't a bad solution.

But even that became somewhat unwieldy and still wasn't very secure. It also suffered from the main problem people have in creating their own passwords: they all tend to be the same (so you can remember them) or a variation of a theme (again, easy to remember). This is a terrible problem because once somebody knows one of your passwords, they will likely know them all.

Personally, I've been using a password manager for several years. It allows me to access my passwords on my computer or phone and creates wickedly complicated passwords that I don't ever need to remember – because they're in my password vault. I only have to remember one single password. All the rest are stored safely and encrypted. So, it's a very secure system for storing passwords, but what about sharing them?

Most password managers allow you to create password sets or vaults for different family members. So, my passwords are separate from my wife's and each of my kids, and then we have a set of shared family passwords. Using this, I was able to create a vault for my mother's passwords and invite my brother to join my 'family' so that he could also see her passwords. Admittedly, it works best with immediate family, but you can use password managers like this that are designed for companies and teams across family groups as well.

There are other ways to share passwords securely. Our Google

spreadsheet was a variation of using cloud storage services like Microsoft OneDrive, Apple iCloud, Dropbox and the like. With these cloud storage services, you can share documents (like spreadsheets) and have good control over who can access your documents as well. Online project management tools, again designed for businesses, are another option.

One thing you should never, ever do is share passwords via text messages or email. Both are too insecure and barely different than writing it down on a piece of paper. If you ABSOLUTELY must share a password this way, it's better to call the person you're sharing with, or split it up, like sending the userID by text message, part of the password by email and the rest by phone. At least this way, if one form is compromised (like your email getting hacked), the person doesn't have the whole password. You could also use a site like onetimesecret.com which creates a secure link that is only available once and then deleted forever.

No system is going to be perfect, but the more secure you can make your password sharing, the more secure your financial and health information will be.

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The War on Planning Groups

Imagine if all democratically elected officials had to "apply" to keep their jobs. And the candidates they defeated were invited to apply for those jobs. And the "winners" were chosen behind closed doors.

This is called "overturning elections," and it's exactly what is happening to San Diego's 53 community planning groups, including District 3's five groups: Downtown, Greater Golden Hill, Mission Valley, North Park, and Uptown.

For nearly 60 years, planning groups have exemplified the power of local democracy. Like my mother before me, I was elected to the North Park Planning Committee, and I know from direct experience that these all-volunteer groups work tirelessly to represent the will of their communities.

A few years ago, the City's power elite abruptly declared war on planning groups, complaining that group members just weren't the right sort of people. Every member has now been asked for personal information that includes age, race, and income.

City Hall will use that information to either bestow official "recognition" on these elected groups OR withdraw it and replace them with hand-picked groups that NEVER WERE ELECTED!

This assault on local democracy was done at the direction of "strong mayor" Todd Gloria. And our City Council either helped lead the charge or stayed quiet on the sidelines.

"Complaints that planning groups 'kill off housing' have no basis in fact. These advisory groups have never had the power to curb growth. They can only make recommendations that convey the general will of their communities. City Hall can and routinely does ignore that input.

"The real problem here is that elected officials and their allies in the building industry are easily bruised. Even after a string of victories (proliferation of accessory dwelling units, passage of Senate Bills 9 and 10), they continue to fret. They want

total public acquiescence, and they will brook no opposition.

"Stifling the messenger to block the message never works. Community residents who are feeling the strain of disastrous land-use policies will not be silenced. As North Park's three-year battle over the 30th Street bike lanes has shown, when politicians try to shut out constituents, our resolve strengthens, and our voices get louder."

I am running for the D3 Council seat to challenge City Hall's culture of autocracy. If elected, I will support our planning groups, provide the resources these volunteers badly need, and fight any efforts to overturn their elections.

Starting with the Sept. 28 Greater Golden Hill meeting, I will attend every D3 planning group meeting to thank the members and personally attest to the value of their work.

Three-month-old Red Panda Cub Named In time for International Red Panda Day

In time for International Red Panda Day, the 3-month-old red panda cub at the San Diego Zoo, received her new name. The endangered cub will now be called Pavitra (pronounced pah-vee-tra), which means "sacred" in Nepali. Pavitra was born June 9 to first-time parents Adira and Lucas, and she is the first red panda born at the Zoo since 2006.

Red pandas are listed as endangered on the International Union for Conservation of Nature Red List of Threatened Species, due to their dwindling global population. They face many threats, including habitat loss and degradation related to increased human encroachment and climate change. San Diego Zoo Wildlife Alliance collaborates with multiple partners to identify unprotected red panda habitats, train teams to monitor the health of the forest and provide awareness-building workshops in communities in Nepal where red pandas live.

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Sumatran Tiger Cub Twins' Names Announced



The tiger cubs account for only 400 to 600 Sumatran tigers remaining on earth.

Two Sumatran tiger cubs, born at the San Diego Zoo Safari Park in July, have now been officially named. The female cub is Puteri (pronounced Poo-tear-e), which means "princess" in Malay; and the male cub is Hutan (pronounced Hoo-taan), which means "forest." The cubs were born July 12 to first-time mother Diana and father Dumai and are the first of this critically endangered species to be born at the Safari Park's Tull Family Tiger Trail habitat in seven years.

Sumatran tigers are listed as critically endangered on the International Union for Conservation of Nature Red List of Threatened Species. With only an estimated 400 to 600 Sumatran tigers remaining on earth, these births are significant in increasing the worldwide population of this tiger species and furthering the nonprofit San Diego Zoo Wildlife Alliance's ongoing work to conserve them.

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






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"His Place at the Table," a memoir by ENF's Co-Founder, Diane Nares.

I go back in time and speak to my later-in-life opportunity to find meaningful love, marriage, and motherhood. Richard and I were unwavering in our commitment to one another, as grief took us into unchartered territories.

Ultimately, through our spiritual strength and the expansion of our "family" by establishing the Emilio Nares Foundation, we found ways to heal and transform our lives. Emilio's Legacy continues, as the little boy who inspired a movement.

Diane Nares is the co-founder of the Emilio Nares Foundation, a non-profit charity which provides transportation and other vital support to families who are navigating through their child's journey with cancer. Nares expresses her passion for life in a wide range of pursuits, from comforting parents who have lost their child, to participating in family bereavement groups, to hosting ENF's annual food & beverage fundraiser. Born in Los Angeles, Diane Nares is a "self-proclaimed" later-in-life wife and mother to her only child, Emilio. Emilio lost his life to leukemia shortly before his sixth birthday. In addition to being a respected speaker, Nares enjoys traveling internationally, swimming, yoga, cooking, and hiking with her husband. Richard.

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
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Kate Callen Announces Candidacy for San Diego City Council District 3

Kate Callen, a long-time North Park community activist and former journalist, has announced her candidacy for the San Diego City Council.

"I'm running to give District 3 residents and small business owners a seat at the table where City Hall decides the fate of their neighborhoods," Callen pledged. "The diverse voices of our district's communities all deserve to be heard and respected, and that will be my focus."

"I also will challenge the city's fiscal management and budget priorities. If the Mayor and the City Council can spend millions on bike lanes and squander tens of millions on 101 Ash Street, they can find the money to maintain Balboa Park, fix broken sidewalks, clear trash from our streets and canyons, and invest in the infrastructure we need to accommodate rampant growth."

"I will call for sensible limits on multi-unit ADUs with no on-site parking that are engulfing our neighborhoods. Too many are enriching outside investors, and virtually none provide low-income housing for low-wage earners."

"I will immediately push to create housing for homeless families with children - NO child should sleep in parks or in cars - and I will work to build the public-private partnerships that can deliver the truly affordable housing San Diego's workers desperately need."

Callen's writing career has included stints as United Press International's San Diego bureau chief and speechwriter for four University of California CEOs. She co-founded the SoNo Neighborhood Alliance and served on the North Park Planning Committee. She is an alumna of the University of Pennsylvania and Columbia University.

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

Mama's Kitchen Calls for Volunteer Support

Every day, thousands of critically ill San Diegans rely on the free meal delivery service provided by Mama's Kitchen. For over three decades, the nonprofit organization has made nutritious, medically tailored meals, packaged and delivered with care to homes by Mama's Kitchen volunteers year-round.

As the largest nonprofit provider of homedelivered meals in San Diego and the sole provider of medically tailored meals, Mama's Kitchen is issuing an urgent community-wide call for volunteers ahead of the busy holiday season. Currently, the organization needs volunteer help in three main areas: meal delivery, kitchen/staging, and phone/office support. The urgent need for volunteers is a result of a continuing surge in demand for medically tailored meals for individuals experiencing a health complication that leaves them homebound.

Mama's Kitchen CEO Alberto Cortés urges community members to consider volunteering, saying, "No amount of volunteer support is too small—even picking up a single meal delivery shift once a month, which takes less than three hours, can have a tremendous impact."

While the Hunger Coalition reports that San Diego's hunger rates have receded to prepandemic rates, Mama's Kitchen continues to see sky-rocketing need from the critically ill population. The long-term impacts of the pandemic have resulted in rising rates of chronic illness, and Mama's Kitchen now receives close to 400 new referrals each month. As the nonprofit closed out its 2022-2023 fiscal year in June, Mama's Kitchen was shocked to find that they delivered a record-breaking 816,920 medically tailored meals, which is a 22 percent increase over the prior year.

"We continue to see more critically ill community members enrolling in our Medically Tailored Meal Service," says Cortés. "Along with that comes the need for increased volunteer support, especially for delivery drivers, to ensure each client has access to this crucial lifeline. We currently need 200 additional volunteers to meet the community needs we anticipate for

the rest of this year and into 2024."

Responsibilities of meal delivery volunteers include picking up meals and delivering them to clients' homes. Volunteer work in the kitchen/staging category can include plating food, prepping the kitchen, organizing and sorting food items, assembling meal delivery bags, loading delivery vehicles, and more. Volunteers working in phone/office support help with general office tasks at the Mama's Kitchen office (located in the Fairmount Park neighborhood of San Diego), such as filing, organizing, or answering phones. Volunteer opportunities are available Monday through Friday between 8 AM and 6 PM.

Research has shown that volunteering offers meaningful health benefits, especially for older adults. "Volunteering to do a meal delivery for two routes at a time has been the most

memorable experience for us," says Monica, Mama's Kitchen volunteer delivery driver. "My husband and I were happy to deliver in the City Heights and North Park neighborhoods, where we lived when we were growing up."

For community members interested in volunteering with Mama's Kitchen, the first step is to complete a volunteer application. Next, prospective volunteers attend a 30-minute volunteer orientation session (virtual or inperson), where they learn more about Mama's Kitchen and the volunteer opportunities available. Mama's Kitchen requires a background check for delivery driver volunteer positions and conducts reference checks for all non-delivery volunteer positions.

Individuals and families are encouraged to apply. Youth volunteers ages 13+ must be accompanied by a parent or guardian.

New Installations at the Station Mural Highlighting San Diego's Maritime History

NTC Foundation just announced the selection and installation of the newest Installations at the Station art piece between Barracks 14 and 15 in Arts District Liberty Station. Installations at the Station, overseen by the Art in Public Places Committee (AiPP), has brought thought-provoking and stimulating artworks to the community, featuring works from local artists in the San Diego-Baja region. San Diego-based Mexican American artist, Scarlett Baily, was recently selected by AiPP for her installation titled "Home," and began hand-painting the 2,535 square-foot mural depicting the vibrant history of San Diego on Monday, September 18.

"We're so excited to have selected Scarlett Baily's piece as the newest project for Installations at the Station," said Lisa Johnson, President and CEO of the NTC Foundation. "Scarlett's vision to connect the community to San Diego's rich history goes farther than painting a picture of the skyline – it's visual storytelling. Combining different characteristics of the San Diego region with Liberty Station's maritime roots, this installation captures everything Arts District is about."

Baily's mural, titled "Home," intricately weaves the history of the Naval Training Center with indigenous maritime culture on a vast 2,535 square-foot canvas. Evoking the essence of belonging, the artwork celebrates San Diego's heritage through coastal flora, fauna, and a vivid bouquet of native flowers. The installation transports viewers to lush marshes, where the tradition of crafting the Kumeyaay Tule Boat is honored and vintage naval knots acknowledge the city's maritime roots. The mural's narrative unfolds from California gulls on Sunset Cliffs to a profound underwater scene, depicting a gray whale's ancestral journey. An oversized Osprey in the garden encapsulates the wonder of feeling at home in the presence of shared creatures. Symbolizing diverse inhabitants, "Hapai," Kumeyaay for "the people's water," reflects Point Loma's legacy.

Offered Scarlett Baily, "My work explores themes of belonging, rescuing origin stories, traditions, and tales, yet I still needed to ask these same questions about the peninsula. What was the place like generations before Liberty Station? I began researching indigenous maritime culture and had the incredible opportunity to connect with Dr. Stanley Rodriguez, a Kumeyaay professor, and veteran who completed boot camp at the NTC in the 80s. Dr. Rodriguez preserves Kumeyaay maritime traditions, teaching communities how to construct 'Ha Kwaiyo' or tule boats. I am so excited to share this 10,000-plus year-old tradition that continues to thrive with the visitors of Liberty Station."

in action from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Saturday, October 14, and from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Friday, October 13. Here, young women can practice skills without worrying about a poor grade or failure.


